
KEY QUESTION: What caused the Great Fire of London and how do we know about it?

The United Kingdom



London is the Capital City of England.

The Great Fire of London destroyed most of the city in 1666.



Great Fire of London Timeline

Sunday 2nd September 1666

A fire starts in Thomas Farriner's bakery on Pudding Lane. As news of the spread, people run to escape its path. Samuel Pepys starts to write about the fire in his diary.

Monday 3rd September 1666

The fire spreads quickly through the wooden houses that were close together. People carry their possessions to safety using a horse and cart or boats on the River Thames.

Tuesday 4th September 1666

Houses are pulled down in an attempt to stop the fire spreading.
St Paul's Cathedral is destroyed.

Wednesday 5th September 1666

The fire starts to burn more slowly as the wind dies down.

Thursday 6th September 1666

The fire is finally put out.
Thousands are left homeless

Key People

	Thomas Farriner	It is believed that an ember from one of his ovens ignited some nearby firewood. The fire quickly spread through the bakery and to nearby buildings.
	Samuel Pepys	One of the ways we know about the fire is because Samuel Pepys wrote about it in his diary. He used a special shorthand code so no one could read his diary.
	King Charles II	Charles II was the king of England in 1666. After the fire he made a decree that houses must be built further apart and built from stone or bricks not timber.


