
Parents who have concerns about their child's communication and interaction skills and would also like to find out more about Autism are very welcome.

Composer of the week

Amy Beech (1867-1944):



Amy Beach was the first American woman to find success as a composer. She was born Amy Cheney in New Hampshire, and later moved to Boston, where she became well known as a pianist and composer. Amy could play by ear any music she heard, and at the age of four, she composed her first piano pieces in her head. Her mother actually taught her to play the piano when she was six, and at seven she gave her first public performance.

After her marriage to Dr. Henry Beach, she turned her focus to composing, and only gave recitals once a year. Beach was first known for her art songs, but then received national and international attention for her larger works, including a symphony, violin sonata and piano quintet. Many of her works have returned to the concert stage, and hundreds have been recorded.



School attendance is incredibly important. There are 190 school days in the school year, this means that there are 175 non school days where appointments, trips and holidays can be made. Whilst time off school to attend medical appointments is allowed, we do ask that non urgent appointments such as routine dentist appointments are made outside of school hours where possible. Head Injuries at Home

Following the recent death of a child who sustained a head injury at home, the Childhood Death Review Team would like to highlight the importance of following the NHS Guidelines in relation to seeking medical advice if they have any symptoms.

Children are incredibly active, and they have little sense of danger, so it is not surpising that they are prone to head injuries. In addition, their heads are large in proportion to their bodies and therefore more vulnerable to damage than adult heads. Head injuries may involve the scalp, the skull, the brain, or its protective membranes.

Most head injuries are not serious, but you should get medical help if your child has any symptoms after a head injury.

Preventing head injuries in children

Falls are the most common cause of accidental injury to children. While most falls aren't serious, active children often fall over and some dalls can lead to death or long-term disbility. So it's important to get the message across about the simple things that parents and carers can do to prevent serious falls.

How many children are injured in falls?

- Everyday, 45 children under five are admitted to hospital following a serious fall. Stumbles are to be expected, but more serious falls which lead to head injuries can have a life long impact
- Falls are one of the most common causes of childhood accidents.
- Falls are also a serious risk for older children. Each year, around 27,000 children aged 5-14 are admitted to hospital after a fall.


